

As the new school year begins in Missouri, Courage2Report has seen a steady increase of reports throughout August and into September for the School Violence Prevention Tipline, reflecting the return of students and families to school routines. The two most common types of tips submitted were complaints regarding school policy and threats to kill others.

Success Story:

Recently C2R was notified of a TikTok post in which an individual had suggested the best time to kill the most people would be when busses are loading or unloading at school and to shoot everyone on the bus and to then kill themselves. C2R was able to identify this student, locate his current address which was in another state, and send an officer to his house. With the help of resources available at the MIAC and with the schools help MIAC was able to facilitate communication between the states and law enforcement agencies involved, possibly preventing a school shooting.

Knowledge and Best Practices:


School officials can use the HSIN room to access and exchange information about potential threats, vulnerabilities and effective safety strategies, helping to strengthen school safety plans.

Groypers, meme culture, school shooters, and 'Anomie Extremism'

Why are teens posting frog memes, wearing nazi patches, and using codewords like "1488" or "TJD" before they commit a school shooting?

""Groyper Appeal to Teens

The Groyper movement targets schools and young people on purpose because they believe the culture war will be won by defeating traditional institutions.

Public education is framed as Marxist and globalist. Teachers are labeled as "groomers", DEI programs are mocked as "anti-white", and standard school-based public health programs like sex ed (that have existed since the 1950s) are called brainwashing. Any schools, textbooks, or educators who embrace diversity and teach history or social theories become their enemies.

The Groyper strategy isn't just memes and trolling, it's using students and young adults to breakdown high schools and universities from the inside out. Teens who are Groypers don't walk into school wearing a swastika armband (until the time when they open fire in the cafeteria). Instead, it's subtle and layered in plausible deniability like:

- Doodling of a Groyper frog or posting "1488" on Snapchat.
- Posting memes wearing wrap-around style sunglasses (below).
- Wearing a MASA hat (Make America Straight Again).
- Chanting "America First" during a Pride or diversity event on campus.
- Student group chats with racial slurs, Holocaust jokes, and videos of Nick Fuentes.











By the time a parent sees a concerning Discord message or a teacher reports a student quoting from Fuentes' show, the radicalization has already begun. The danger isn't just in what the student believes because the movement is designed to isolate teens from adults, normalizes hate, and rewards them with attention and recognition if they escalate to real world violence.""

""Likely Groyper connections to recent school shootings:

Evergreen High School (CO), September 2025:

- 16-year-old was part of the 'WatchPeopleDie' online group and he commented on posts about shootings in Parkland, Buffalo, and Quebec City mosque.
- He expressed white nationalist and neo-Nazi beliefs.
- On the skull mask he wrote: "AL NOOR" the name of the New Zealand mosque Tarrant attacked; "14" reference to a white supremacist 14 words slogan combined with "88" to form "1488," a numerical code for "Heil Hitler" (since H is the 8th letter of the alphabet); Celtic cross in the white supremacist version which consists of a square cross interlocking with or surrounded by a circle; and "TJD" shorthand for Total Jew Death.

Annunciation Catholic School (MN), August 2025:

- Phrases written on the weapons draw from meme culture including "suck on this," "there is no message," "release the list" (likely a reference to the Epstein list), and "skibidi" (Skibidi toilet meme).
- Other messages on weapons are white nationalist and antisemitic including "kick a spic," "Burn Israel," "6 million wasn't enough," and "Extra Thicc! [sic] Jew Gas"
- Direct reference to 2024 Abundant Life shooter on the weapon.

Antioch High School (TN), January 2025:

- 17-year-old shooter's username on social media was a direct homage to the Madison, WI school shooter. Her last name was Rupnow and he combined that with "groyper".
- He wrote messages on his gun including "TND" (total nig**r death) which is a common abbreviation posted online by white nationalist groups.

Before the shooting, he posted a photo replicating a popular Groyper meme with Pepe squatting in a, ADIDAS-brand tracksuit.







Abundant Life Christian School (WI), December 2024

- 15-year-old girl posted a range of white supremacist and antisemitic memes (including Nazi images and racist "statistics") with a bio including the phrase "Totally normal day". This is wording often used by racist or white supremacist users as a code for "TND," or "total n***** death."
- She participated in a Telegram chat for the attack by Arda Küçükyetim, the Turkish neo-Nazi who stabbed five people outside a Turkish mosque on August 12, 2024.
- Right before the school shooting started, she posted the "okay" hand gesture, which is used in some extremist circles as a way to troll viewers (same photo was posted by the Antioch High shooter a month later).""





Crime in Schools, 2020-2024

Executive Summary

The FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program collects crime data from agencies across the country through the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). From 2020 to 2024, agencies reported 1,299,063 criminal incidents occurring at school locations via NIBRS. There were 1,504,310 offenses; 1,539,149 victims; and 1,250,077 known offenders associated with those incidents. This subset of NIBRS data shows the following information was reported:

- Assaults were the most reported offenses in the Crimes Against Persons category.
- · Larceny/thefts were the most reported crimes in the Crimes Against Property category.
- Drug/narcotic offenses were the most reported crimes in the Crimes Against Society category.
- When a weapon was involved in a crime, it was most often personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.).
- The most common month for incidents to occur was September.
- Most victims who were 18 years of age or younger were between 13 and 15 years old.
- Most victims were female.
- The most reported race of victims was White; the most reported ethnicity was Not Hispanic or Latino.
- · Most victims were residents of the jurisdiction where the incident occurred.
- Many of the victims were not hurt or suffered only a minor injury and were acquainted with the
 offender.
- When looking at the known offenders, the age group reported most frequently was 13-15; sex, male; race, White; and ethnicity, Not Hispanic or Latino.

The age group 10-12 is especially significant. This age is before middle school and any interventions in the form of emotional intelligence programs and school safety behaviors must begin in elementary school for successful outcomes.

Offender Age

The age was reported for 1,250,077 offenders when school was the location of the incident. The age group with the highest number of offenders over the 5-year period was 13 to 15. (See Table 9.)


Victim Age

The victim age groups used in Table 6 typically define various levels of class types (i.e., elementary, middle school, high school, or college). It should be noted when the victim is an officer, the only valid ages are 17 through 98 years. The age group with the highest number of victims over the 5-year period was 19 or older. For ages 18 or under, victims were most frequently reported in the 13 to 15 age group.

Gang Activity, 2021-2024

Highlights

- The highest rate of incidents involving gang activity was in 2021 with a rate of 7.1 incidents per 100,000 inhabitants.
- Aggravated assault was the most reported (39.4%) offense in gang-related incidents.
- Weapons were used in 80.4% of gang-related incidents.
- Ages 13 to 16 years old were the most reported age group for victims and offenders.
- 67.1% of offenders were known to the victim in some manner.

From 2021 to 2024, victims aged 13 to 16 years were the most-reported victim age group. Over a quarter (25.8%) of victims were juveniles under the age of 18, and more than half (56.3%) of the victims were under the age of 30.






